You can also convert YouTube or Google videos. Zamzar provides a convenient browser add-on to make this task even easier. A great resource for educators, for example, who'd like to a video, but don't have internet access in the classroom



There are free and paid versions of the Zamzar service. The free version may be all you need. Paid subscriptions start at \$7 USD per month and offer the ability to convert larger files, a personal inbox for online file storage and faster file conversions. (All subscriptions are on a monthly basis and can be cancelled at any time.)

A new heroin influx

While the media concentrates on the alcopop debate, another drug is making a come-back in Australia. Global opium production is at an all-time high and Australia is at risk of a new flood of heroin, warns the Australian National Council on Drugs. The Age cites a leading expert in harm-reduction programs among injecting drug users in South-East Asia, Prof. Nick Crofts of the Nossal Institute for Global Health at the University of Melbourne, as saying that Australia had been instrumental in persuading several countries in the region to adopt methadone programs, but that they were "still in the early stages of development".

Since the last issue of Starlink, we have created individual blogs and begun writing personal and professional reflections. It remains an interesting journey for both of us!

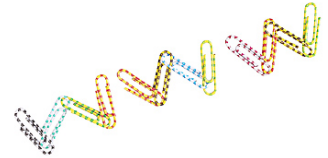

Kids Speak Out About Mobile Phones

Published online on 4 April, 2009, this report is from the NSW Commission for Children and Young People.

More than 1,500 children and young people in Years 6 and 9 were asked about how mobile phones fit into their lives. The survey found that *mobile phones support kids by helping them to be independ-*

ent. Mobiles also help kids organise their daily lives, support their relationships including family relationships when parents are separated, provide entertainment, and help them feel safer.

One of my few treasured possessions is an old music box that plays Waltzing Matilda.

The two rusted screws, metal cover and wood backing panels are loose and the wind up handle is missing.

I remember when I swapped my cheap plastic camera for the music box 48 years ago.

I was 8 years old and hanging around with my mate John, near Frank Dempsey's butcher shop in Kerr Street, Fitzroy.

John's dad walked up to us and spotted my camera and offered to swap. He turned the handle on the music box several times and Waltzing Matilda played. I was instantly captivated by the sound, ignoring his alcoholic breath and dishevelled appearance.

I can still see his tilted head and smiling eyes watching my fascination at a small tin box that played music.

If someone were to see my music box now they would throw it away as a piece of junk. I could never do that because it's a connection to my youth and an experience that still makes me smile.

Sometimes our most treasured possessions can be as simple as a rusted old music box.
